ASHP Foundation Pharmacy Residency Excellence Program Award

The UVA PGY-1 Pharmacy Residency program was bestowed with the 2017 Pharmacy Residency Excellence Program Award by the ASHP Foundation! Recipients of this award demonstrate innovation in training pharmacy residents and serve as models for other residency programs. ASHP highlighted that UVA's program has trained more than 120 PGY-1 pharmacy residents over the past 25 years. Sixtytwo percent of alumni have gone on to complete a PGY-2 residency, with 60 percent of those completing their PGY-2 training at UVA.
